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Application Pending (AP) Status

I hear many ask "Why can't I get an ID Card?" You only need to see if you are still AP Status. If you are Application Pending (AP), then you have some work to do. You must complete Core Training (AUXCT) and Basic Qualification Course - II (BQC-II).

We have an unusual high number of members in AP Status. It is not that difficult to complete the courses. There are members who freeze-up trying to take a test. If you are one if those people, ask for help. There are many members ready to help you during your difficult time.

AUXCT has seven (7) courses (link: https://auxlearning.uscg.mil/Default.asp). Five need to be renewed every five (5) years. The last two (2) are permanent. Take those 2 once and you are done.

The five (5) subjects are:

1. Workforce Resilience
Training

- 2. Security Fundamentals
- Privacy at DHS: Protecting Personal Information
- 4. Sexual Harassment Prevention
- 5. Civil Rights Awareness
- 6. Ethics I / Personal Gifts
- 7. Basic Qualification Course II

For BQC-II you need to understand the background and history of the Auxiliary as a prerequisite for further courses and training. There are six (6) areas to cover:

Core Values and Missions

- 2. Courtesy and Protocols
- Human Resources & Awards
- 4. Member Training and Uniforms
- Membership Requirements and Structure
- 6. Support, Materials and Reimbursement

We must find ways to help those in AP Status to move up. It does not look good for Division I or your Flotilla if you have a high number in AP Status. Support your Flotilla with mentors to encourage they help those listed as Application Pending. We need to help them become Initially Qualified (IQ) or Basically Qualified (BQ). If we can do that, we can quietly stick our chest and feel "Look what I did." Be proud of it.

On 27 February 2025 I passed out and taken to a Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital. I ran out of one medication that was required. I tried to refill the prescription for two (2) weeks with no luck. When I arrived at the hospital my blood pressure was 50 over I2 and I was near death.

This was the first time I had a problem using VA. The VA pharmacy is very good, but the Doctor needs to be aware of the needs of the patient and not putting the patient in any health dangers. For me this was dangerous.

I was in the hospital over one (I) month and constantly checked. I had no idea I was that serious until long after admission. The staff at VA did a wonderful job of bringing me back to "the living."

During my time in the hospital, I was asked questions that really surprised me. They asked me where I was located (hospital and city) and what year, month and day it was. I answered all correctly, but the questions surprised me.

A surprise that shocked me while there. I went to the hospital with my phone, hearing aides and My Life Alert. After several weeks my phone and new hearing aids disappeared as well as My Life Alert. It appears they thought they were trash and never seen again. I still have my charger for my hearing aids and phone, but no phone or hearing aids and My Life Alert.
